# **HOW WE DO THE WORK**

Our approach is a systems-change effort designed to dramatically improve how communities and states respond to the needs of young people who are transitioning from foster care to adulthood. We work at the local, state and national levels to improve policies and practices. Paramount to this work is a commitment to making sure all young people everywhere regardless of race or ethnicity — have equitable opportunities to achieve well-being and success.

### **BEST PRACTICES**

The Jim Casey Initiative's approach, rooted in adolescent brain research, employs best practices to engage young people in the decisions that shape their lives; apply a racial and ethnic equity lens to reduce system-level disparities; leverage community partnerships to develop resources; use data and evaluation of progress to improve outcomes; and build public will to create better policies that sustain enhancements over time.





# WHO WE ARE

The Annie E. Casey Foundation's Jim Casey Youth Opportunities Initiative® works to ensure that young people — ages 14 to 26 — in the United States who have spent at least one day in foster care after their 14th birthday have the resources, relationships and opportunities to achieve well-being and success. The Jim Casey Initiative does this by creating opportunities for young people to form permanent family connections, experience stable housing, achieve positive outcomes in education, become economically secure and make informed decisions about when to become parents.

young people have spent at least one day in foster care after their 14th birthday.

of young people 14 and older who exited care in FY 2018 **achieved permanence** (reunification, adoption, guardianship or kinship care).
