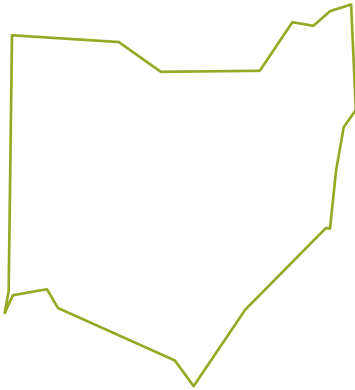


# Ohio



There are written policies to identify expectant and parenting mothers and fathers in foster care who are 18 and younger, as well as noncustodial mothers and fathers who are 18 and younger.

Data are collected on the number and custodial status of children born to youth in foster care; the number of healthy births of children born to parents in foster care; and the race and ethnicity, length of stay and permanency status of parenting youth in foster care.

The state of Ohio provides extended foster care to age 21 under Title IV-E.
