

# Oregon



There are no written policies or practices to identify or serve expectant and parenting youth in foster care. Data are collected on young women who are parenting; the number of children of parents in foster care; the number of healthy births of children born to parents in foster care; and the race and ethnicity, length of stay and permanency status of parenting youth in foster care.

The state of Oregon provides extended foster care to age 21 under Title IV-E and Chafee services up to age 23.
