Rhode Island Ranks 26th in the 2026 National KIDS COUNT Data Book

*Annual Report Introduces New Index to Increase Accountability
By Showing How State Policies and Public Investment Improve Children's Lives*

JUNE 8, 2026 – PROVIDENCE, RI — Rhode Island ranks 26th among the 50 states for child well-being, according to the 2026 *KIDS COUNT® Data Book* released today by —the Annie E. Casey Foundation, an annually published resource that tracks child well-being across the country. Every year, the *Data Book* presents national and state data from 16 indicators in four domains — economic well-being, education, health, and family and community factors — and ranks the states according to how children are faring overall and by domain. Rhode Island’s rank of 26th, based on 2024 data, is a drop from its rank of 20th based on 2023 data.

For the first time this year, states receive a comprehensive score (from 0 to 1,000) in the Data Book, not just a ranking. The scores track 16 indicators in four domains — economic well-being, education, health, and family and community factors — over a five-year period from 2019 to 2024. The new scoring system shows whether policies and public investment are actually improving children’s lives, not merely how states compare to each other. Rhode Island received a score of 583, slightly above the national score of 547.

- Rhode Island’s lower overall ranking is driven primarily by declines in Economic Well-Being and Family & Community Context.
- Based on data from 2023, Rhode Island ranked 26th in Economic Well-Being and 14th in Family and Community; using the most recent data from 2024, the state ranks 36th and 26th, respectively.
- Rhode Island saw stability in Education, with a score of 408, and improvement in Health score, moving from 682 to 737.

In its 37th year of publication, the *KIDS COUNT® Data Book* provides reliable statewide data to help leaders see where progress is being made, where greater support is needed, and which strategies are making a difference. By offering both a big-picture view and a local road map, the *Data Book* equips policymakers, advocates, and communities with the information they need to make decisions that help kids and young people thrive throughout their lives.

“Behind every number in this report is a child who is either hungry or fed, housed or homeless, progressing academically or falling behind. No state is consistently getting this right,” said Lisa M. Lawson, President and CEO of the Annie E. Casey Foundation. “The Data Book challenges us to follow the evidence and do what delivers results.”

Rhode Island’s rankings for the four domains are below:

- **Economic Well-Being:** 36th
- **Education:** 25th
- **Health:** 11th
- **Family & Community Context:** 26th

“We know what kids need to grow up healthy and connected so they can thrive as adults: Stable homes, strong schools, nutritious food, meaningful relationships and opportunities to learn, play and grow,” said Rhode Island KIDS COUNT Executive Director Paige Parks. “Programs that meet these needs are smart investments, fostering long-term gains like employment and economic growth.”
